SIX MILE CYPRESS PKWY CHANGES DAILY

The roadway project that is underway on Six Mile Cypress is on schedule to be finished early in 2012. The base for the additional two lanes is currently being readied and the new alignment for the intersection at Penzance Boulevard at the entrance of the Slough is also underway. The new traffic signals are in place but will not be operational until the final geometrics for the intersection are done, and the entire project is ready to open to traffic.

Visitors, workers and volunteers should be pleased with the addition of the traffic signals that will make the entrance and exit to the Slough much safer.



SLOUGH HOSTS 66,000 VISITORS JANUARY TO APRIL


KIDS COMMENT ON CAMP



Know that the Bladderwort will have bladders, modified leaves, when its nutrition needs require the digestion of small aquatic



animals. (A plant's vitamin pill!) A tree limb is blown into the rising wet season water and becomes a nursery tree as it decomposes and provides soil for ferns and small shrubs. I stand in awe and marvel at the Cypress trees with their knees and the Resurrection Ferns that thrive where their needs are met and respond to the changes that come. 

FRIENDS ORGANIZATION CELEBRATES TEN YEAR ANNIVERSARY

The first members of Friends held an exploratory meeting on February 21, 2001. In the first newsletter then President Gayle Schmidt said "What brought them together was a desire to promote environmental education and enhance the capabilities of staff and volunteers as they do work to broaden understanding and respect for the complex wetland community the Preserve represents." The mission to preserve, protect and promote the Slough for future generations through education and community partnerships was in place at that time.

Less than a year from that February meeting the group was incorporated and had already co-hosted two events, the 10 year anniversary of the Slough boardwalk and the Born to be Wild celebration. The original board consisted of Gayle Schmidt as President, Ben Johnson as Vice President, Alan Cadkin as Treasurer and Joyce Sanders as Secretary. The membership chair-persons were Alouise Skehan and Lee Marks, Rudy Lampron and Conrad Massa worked on special projects and Ann Massa served as a generalist.

The advisory board consisted of Carolyn Delizia (Swift) and Dr. William Hammond, both are still serving in the same capacity now.

The first Gathering of Friends was held January 21, 2002 at the Calusa Nature Center and Planetarium with Dr. Hammond as the speaker along with former students of the Monday Group that shared their experiences and roles in preserving the Slough for posterity.

Five years later the newsletter reported the community support of donations from over 300 members, individuals and businesses towards bringing the Interpretive Center to reality. There is the announcement of the partnership with South Florida Water Management District and the donation of \$200,000 towards the building of the Interpretive Center.

The Swing for the Slough golf tournament in the Summer of 2006 added \$23,000 to the Interpretive Center building fund. Another golf outing would follow a year later.

March 20, 2007 was the long anticipated day for the ground breaking for the Interpretive Center. Also that day the Friends presented a check for \$50,000 to the Lee County Board of Commissioners for use for the Green Building Certification.

These are just a few of the highlights of our organizations history. Our next ten years will be as successful and as productive as the first ten.
