GREAT FLORIDA BIRDING AND WILDLIFE TRAIL

The Great Florida Birding and Wildlife Trail (GFBWT) is a program of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, supported in part by the Florida Department of Transportation and the Wildlife Foundation of Florida. The Six Mile Cypress Slough Preserve is one of the sites in the South Florida section of the GFBWT. Recently the sign marking the Slough section of this trail was installed at the front entrance of the Slough. (Note: The logo on the trail marker is the swallow-tailed kite.)

This 2,000-mile, self-guided highway trail connects nearly 500 birding and wildlife viewing sites throughout Florida. It is designed to conserve and enhance Florida's wildlife habitats by promoting birding and wildlife viewing activities, conservation education and economic opportunity.

The Great Florida Birding and Wildlife Trail is divided into four sections.

The East Florida Section opened in November 2000.

The West Florida Section followed in November 2002.

The Panhandle Florida Section opened in May 2004.

The South Florida Section opened January 2006, completing the statewide trail.

CALUSA BLUEWAY PHOTO CONTEST

Lee County Parks and Recreation has launched its fifth annual Calusa Blueway Photo Contest for boaters, kayakers and nature enthusiasts. Entries can be submitted from now until October 5th, with prizes awarded at the annual Calusa Blueway Festival in November.

Categories include: People on the trail (people enjoying the waterways, trails and outdoors), wildlife on the Blueway trail (flora, fauna and landscapes) and signs along the Blueway trail (Calusa Blueway markers, etc.)

Prizes for top category winners will come from sponsors Harmon Photographers and ABC Framing. First place winners will receive an enlarged, matted and framed version of their photos. Winning entries also may be published in magazines, newspapers and online products.

Selected entries may be featured on websites, including www.calusablueway.com, www.calusabluewaypaddlingfestival.com and on the festival's Facebook site.

There is no enry fee. Submissions must be taken along a Lee County waterway and include a photographer's name, address, phone number, e-mail address, and title and location. One entry is permitted per photographer per category: amateur photographers only, please. A model release form is available and necessary if a person in a submitted photo is identifiable. CONSERVATION 2020 PROTECTS OUR NATURAL WORLD

After a very enjoyable guided walk have your visitors ever asked you where else they could go for more hiking and bird watching? Did you know that we have a brochure at the front desk that gives you some suggestions? It's in the folder labeled "Programs" and there are recommendations for other guided walks, boardwalks, dog parks, and hiking and bird watching sites.

Several of the recommended sites are Conservation 2020 preserves, some of which we have visited on the Friends of Six Mile field trips. Conservation 2020 is part of Lee County Parks and Recreation, and the program's mission is to acquire properties of environmental significance, restore them to their natural state and condition, manage them in an environmentally acceptable manner, and provide public recreational access that is compatible with protecting the natural resource.

If you visit <u>www.conservation2020.org</u>, and click on preserves, you will get a list of each of the 43 preserves currently in the program. Visiting the individual web pages can provide you with descriptions of the parcel, maps, management plans and staff contact information.

Currently, there are more than 24,000 acres acquired under the program. Funding, which comes from an assessment of .05 mils on assessed property in Lee County, is limited. Nominations from willing sellers that comply with program goals will be placed on a list for purchase consideration pending availability of funds.

There probably is a C2020 property somewhere near you. They are great spots for photography and nature study, and several provide opportunities for walking with your dog and riding your horse. I have been on most of the ones with public access, and they are all different. Check them out. You'll be glad you did.

The certification review highlighted two of Florida Master Naturalist Connie Langmann's guided kayak adventures. The first is her one-of-a-kind bat tour. Lee County visitation was down 7.4% from January - April 2012, but interestingly, the length of stay was longer than last year. The total expenditures however increased 2.5 %. Attendance at the slough from January-April, 2011 was 66,125; January-April 2012 was 69,169, an increase of 4.6%.

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CONFIRMED SIGHTING OF CROC IN SLOUGH

Imagine my surprise when walking with friends around the boardwalk at the Slough, we indeed did spot a croc! It was lurking on the outskirts of Otter Pond in the ferns. I took some photos to confirm the sighting. My only concern is that not being a shoe devotee, I am not positive that it is actually a Croc © and not a Croc mimic.

It just goes to show you that you never know what you are going to see at the Slough. It leaves me wondering, did anyone see a person hobbling along the boardwalk with only one shoe?

ROAD IMPROVEMENT UPDATE

The consultant engineer for the improvement of Six Mile Cypress Parkway from Daniels Road to Colonial Boulevard reports that the completion of the improvement is now estimated to be some time in the fall.

In mid July drivers will see a traffic shift with one lane in each direction using the outside two lanes. The contractor will be doing work in the median and the two inside lanes. The contractor is having difficulty obtaining the asphalt. There will be furious activity for two days with trucks and pavers, and then no action for a week.

The completion date is subject to the rainy season now. I will watch the progress.



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
