


THE BEGINNING

From the first moment that Rudy Lampron, Alan Cadkin, Joyce Sanders, Alouise Skehan, Walter and Cathy Sedlacek, Ben and I talked about forming a Friends of the Slough, a visitor center was a big part of the vision. Education and Program Specialist Mary Rude's office was off site at Lakes Park and it had serious issues. For gatherings like trainings or working with campers there was only the amphitheater and trailhead kiosk. There was nothing for campers if the weather turned bad.

Roger Clark who had helped conceive and champion Conservation 20/20 was in management at Lee County Parks & Recreation. His was an important voice and he wasn't a real fan of a visitor center because of the disturbance it would cause to the land. If a center were to happen, he was most interested in a pine uplands area which is to the right as you first drive into the Slough. The edge of the mitigation area was a favorite of the Friends Board because of its proximity to the boardwalk. We kept batting around these various sites in discussion because there was also the size of the building to consider.



THE STORY CONTINUES...

But then we were alerted that the city of Fort Myers was deep into plans to extend Penzance to go right through the Slough. If I remember correctly, the city was planning to move the Slough's flow through a special culvert or pipe system that was experimental and intended to guarantee no pollution would reach the water. It disturbed us that the City was that far along in planning. It immediately became clear to the Board that the building had to be situated directly on Penzance as a barrier to any road construction. It was unimaginable that anyone could even consider impeding/diverting/ doing anything whatsoever to the Slough's flow. Any skepticism dissolved; everyone was on board. Barbara Manzo, Deputy Director, Parks & Recreation at that time, was an amazing advocate, working behind the scenes with the County Manager's office to speed things along. Mary Rude knew the best architects to be involved in an eco-friendly project and got that started. It was really important that the Friends existed at that moment because we provided the passion and grassroots support. And the Cadkin Foundation stepped forward very early with a sizable donation, providing a jumpstart to the project. The Friends had a plan. We were small back then, but we were a voice for the community.

NESTING SEASON AT THE SLOUGH

Do you know what bird regularly uses snakeskins in its nest? Or what birds preen each other as a pair-bonding ritual? You can find the answers to these questions and many more as well as other fun facts about nesting birds of southwest Florida at the What's New at the Slough Exhibit in the Interpretive Center at the Slough.

Love is in the air for the birds that nest in the spring in southwest Florida. Timing for nesting depends on several factors, including the availability of food for the babies hatching, and the warmth provided by more sunlight





with the longer days. Food for the young, including seeds, caterpillars, bugs and small fish, is more plentiful as the weather warms, and there is a longer period of sunlight. Many different birds nest in southwest Florida, from the eagles to the hummingbirds. Birds observed nesting in the Slough this time of year include great egrets and snowy egrets, anhingas, green herons, little blue herons, limpkins, tufted titmice, barred owls, red shouldered hawks, mourning doves, mockingbirds and cardinals.

The new exhibit in the Slough Interpretive Center contains a map of likely sites to observe these nesting birds. There are wooden life-size replicas of the eggs found in the nest and an actual mockingbird nest. There are many fun facts about the birds and their life style plus you can test or enrich your knowledge through some trivia questions. Also included are many photographs of these birds, taken at the Slough. The Friends Corner Store at the Interpretive Center has many good resources for the topics of local birds, nesting and the young. Titles available include "Sibley Field Guide to the Birds of Eastern North America" and "The National Audubon Field Guide to Florida." Once the Slough and the Interpretive Center reopens, please stop by and learn about the nesting occurring in the Slough.

BUTTERFLY DISPLAYS MAKE THEIR DEBUT

New informational butterfly displays sponsored by Friends were unveiled earlier this year in the Slough. Two of the displays are located in the Rock and Stroll Butterfly Garden in the center of our parking lot. One is on the west side of the garden near one of two new beautiful garden arbors. The second one is located at the top of the garden to draw visitors into the center. I had the pleasure of arriving the day staff installed them. My eye was immediately drawn to the vivid colors. Visitors were already strolling through to take a look. These two displays explain the life cycle of butterflies as well as fun facts about the Zebra Longwing, Florida's state butterfly. REMEMBERING FRANK MURRAY

We say a fond farewell to retired Friends' Treasurer Frank Murray who passed away in April.

Frank moved to Cape Coral in 2004 with his wife, Mary, after a 41-year career as a news reporter and editor. He worked at several newspapers in Florida, at the Associated Press in Miami and Washington, and 17 years at The Washington Times from which he retired in 2003 after six years of covering the White House and nine at the Supreme Court. News competitors jokingly accused him of unfairly using his accounting training to decode the Federal budget. Frank was a member of the White House Correspondents Association Board of Directors.

Frank was the Friends' Treasurer for nine years and when he retired at the end of 2016, former Friends President Carolyn Babb said "The Board could be confident that every penny that has been obtained from membership, a donation or Friends Corner store revenue was accounted for and tracked by Frank." Frank didn't like meetings; he'd already attended too many press conferences and meetings in his life. But if we had a question for Frank, the answers were always thoughtful, well-researched and johnny-on-the-spot.

Frank used to stop by the Slough on Sundays when I was working in the Interpretive Center. He would come to pick up the Treasurer's mail and collect donations for deposit. On a Sunday in January a few years ago he came in and I engaged him in conversation. The topic turned to the Martin Luther King holiday and he mentioned he was fortunate enough to be a junior reporter covering MLK and the Civil Rights Movement in the 1960's. Can you imagine the stories he covered during his career?

Frank was a man of many talents and we were lucky to know him and benefit from his expertise.
